"Recognizing the dignity of all, CMHA leads a collaborative response to homelessness that fosters long-term housing stability through prevention, quality services, education and advocacy."

### Convening the Worcester County Continuum of Care (CoC)

CMHA is the convener of the Worcester County Continuum of Care and fosters long term planning for developing the most effective and humane approach to reducing homelessness in the region. Efforts include planning and ongoing collaborations with agencies. In FY 2016, CMHA secured over 6 million dollars to fund 25 vital homeless services and supportive housing projects across the county. Utilizing three full time staff members, CMHA also manages a county wide data collection and reporting system for all homeless programs within the continuum to track success and needs in addressing homelessness. A diverse and broad range of community-based stakeholders serve on the CoC Advisory Board to ensure that services and housing provided by the CoC are the best match to community needs.

### Public Education & Advocacy

Public Education & Advocacy is the heart of CMHA's mission in addressing the root causes of homelessness and encouraging long term housing stability. A commitment to building collaborative and coordinated relationships and strategies is what makes CMHA a unique agency in our community. Working with partners, stakeholders and those who have experienced or are at risk of homelessness across the region, we address barriers to accessing and maintaining affordable housing through civic engagement, public policy, legislative, and budgetary advocacy. Key partners are families and individuals who have experienced homelessness who work to increase community awareness and mobilize support to influence decision makers for systemic changes. In FY 2016, these collective efforts resulted in significant increases to housing assistance resources, prevention of severe eligibility restrictions and expanded key programs to underserved populations.

### Youth Against Homelessness

Youth Against Homelessness (YAH) creates an environment in which local high school students in Central MA have an opportunity to make a positive change in their community and to develop the knowledge and leadership skills to make a direct impact on this critical issue. Area high schools who participate include: Doherty Memorial High School, Burncoat High School, South High Community School, North High School, Worcester

### Hope for Housing


Hope for Housing is a partnership developed with the Interfaith Coalition to Prevent Family Homelessness and CMHA. The project raises community awareness and utilizes the collective buying power of congregations to prevent family homelessness. Currently 30 Worcester area congregations partner with local retailers who donate 2-10% of all sales to CMHA's Hope for Housing homelessness prevention funds. In FY 2016, \$10,830 was distributed to families for homelessness prevention services. Since its inception in 2009, the Hope for Housing Program has distributed over \$234,000 in family homelessness prevention funds. In addition to stabilizing households "at-risk" of homelessness, Hope for Housing provides an opportunity for members of these 30 congregations to better understand the issue of homelessness and to voice their concerns to decision makers.

## P.O.W.E.R. (Personal Opportunities for Work, Education, and Renewal)

P.O.W.E.R. is an innovative program that assists families in shelter and transitional housing to attain long term self-sufficiency. Collaborating with the local workforce development community and the Worcester Community Action Council, P.O.W.E.R. strives to provide employment and educational opportunities that fit each individual's goals, time frame and skill sets.

In FY 2016, a total of 54 individuals received intensive case management and workforce readiness classes. I5 were placed in jobs and 21 in internships through the P.O.W.E.R. program.

We are grateful to our many community partners at the United Way of Central Massachusetts, the Department of Housing and Community Development, Workforce Central Career Center, Habitat for Humanity ReStore, Dress for Success and the Worcester Community Action Council for their support and collaboration.

### Family Shelter

The largest segment of the homeless population in Worcester County continues to be families with school age children. Though the number of households of homeless families decreased by 15% in Worcester County from 2015 to 2016, persons living in homeless families account for 66% of the overall homeless population regionally. The decrease of households is largely due to a collaborative approach to ending homelessness with our partner agencies, such as Friendly House and Catholic Charities. While in shelter, families are assisted and supported to access tools and services in order to overcome barriers and move from homelessness to self-sufficiency and are supported to achieve independent living in their own homes. CMHA currently provides 190 units of family shelter in the region. In FY 2016, family shelter served 190 families and 128 families were successfully re-housed with follow up supportive services.

### HomeBASE Program

HomeBASE is a flexible financial assistance resource available to families eligible for the state's Emergency Assistance (EA) program that provides assistance to help families find housing and move from shelter to housing rapidly. This coordinate Housing First strategy has proven to be a critical piece in reducing the costs of housing families in emergency shelter and overflow hotels. The resources allow families to quickly move to sustainable housing with follow up case management and supportive services. I 28 families were successfully housed with this resource in the last fiscal year. The average assistance per family of \$8,000 makes good fiscal sense in preventing families from languishing in shelter for 6 months at a cost of \$3,000 per month and most importantly this Housing First strategy promotes the independence and quality of life for families to move to self sufficient living.

### Elder Home Repair & Maintenance

The program coordinates closely with partners in the Elder Service and Health Care Network to allow elder homeowners to remain living independently in their own homes through providing repairs and routine maintenance to keep elders safely and independently housed. 556 unduplicated senior homeowners were served in FY 2016. The program promotes healthy independent living for senior homeowners and prevents them from needing to enter more costly institutional settings.

### Housing Counseling and Homelessness Prevention

Housing Counseling is the longest standing and highest volume CMHA program. It's rooted in a prevention first model through providing counseling, education, and mediation to tenants and landlords as to their rights and responsibilities. Community resources, state prevention funds, and other resources are brought together in a holistic approach to address issues that place families at risk of homelessness. Mediation and problem solving is used to resolve housing issues and homeless prevention assistance is made available where the intervention will lead to housing stability.

A total of \$463,865 in prevention resources were distributed to prevent homelessness for 303 households consisting of 842 individuals, including 405 children. An average intervention cost of \$2,991 prevented these households from entering shelter at a cost of \$3,000 per month with an average shelter stay of 6 months. Homelessness prevention is the most cost effective and humane approach for families and our communities.

### Donations Clearinghouse

The Donations Clearinghouse (DCH) collects and redistributes gently used household goods and furniture to those moving from shelter, fleeing domestic violence, recovering from a natural disaster or elders at risk. The DCH helps individuals and families to receive items that make a house a home. Rotmans Furniture and Carpet Store is a key partner in providing this service. Local churches and businesses also hold drives throughout the year. In FY 2016, the DCH assisted 1,377 individuals in 468 Households referred from 67 agencies. 665 Worcester area residents donated 2,114 items.
