"Recognizing the dignity of all, CMHA leads a collaborative response to homelessness that fosters long-term housing stability through prevention, quality services, education and advocacy."

#### Convening the Worcester County Continuum of Care (CoC)

CMHA is the convener of the Worcester County Continuum of Care and fosters long term planning to develop the most effective and humane approach to reducing homelessness in the region. Efforts include planning and ongoing collaborations with all service providers, stakeholders and government partners. In 2019, CMHA secured over 6 million dollars to fund 22 vital homeless services and supportive housing projects across the county. Utilizing three full time staff members, CMHA also manages a county wide data collection and reporting system for all homeless continuum programs to track success and unmet needs in addressing homelessness. A diverse and broad range of communitybased stakeholders serve on the CoC Advisory Board to ensure that services and housing provided by the CoC are the best match to community needs. The CoC provides 450 units of housing annually. A Coordinated Entry system of all providers meets bi-weekly with all relevant providers in order to ensure a reduction of homelessness and more successful and timely placements into safe and affordable housing. We are pleased to partner with the City Manager's Housing first Coordinating Council through providing data and insight in how to address the needs of homeless individuals in our community. A total of 2,250 were assisted through CoC programming in 2019.

#### Public Education & Advocacy

Public Education & Advocacy (PE&A) is at the heart of CMHA's mission in addressing the root causes of homelessness. It works to raise awareness of the real issues of homelessness and lack of affordable housing opportunities. This is done through community education, coalition building, and mobilizing support for policy and budget initiatives resulting in real system changes for those we serve. Recently, over 100 frontline service providers from 43 different agencies attended the Family Housing Information Forum to share and learn about resources available for families in the Worcester County Area. In the spring, PE&A send advocacy action alerts to our partners, supporters and the Worcester Area State Legislative Delegation to support key housing and homelessness prevention initiatives. Along with other state wide advocacy partners, PE&A was a part of a success campaign to expand the Residential Assistance for Families in Transition (RAFT) program to include all populations, including elders, youth and disabled households. Additionally, CMHA staff partnered with the City of Worcester's Housing First Coordinating Council to engage broadly supported outcomes; that protect those who are vulnerable, homeless or at risk within the community.

#### Public Education & Advocacy Continued


Most importantly, the program works with at-risk and formerly homeless families and individuals to influence decision makers and educating the public as to the barriers they face and puts a human face on the issue of homelessness.

### Youth Against Homelessness

Youth against Homelessness (YAH) is comprised of area high school faculty and students joining together to cultivate an atmosphere of engaged learning and positive engagement. CMHA works with area high schools to increase students' knowledge of current issues in the community and work collectively to explore real solutions that they can initiate within their schools and neighborhoods. We are thankful for the support of Hanover Insurance Foundation, UNUM, and Joseph D. Early Jr., Worcester District Attorney, and the Worcester Public Schools for their support for the "Visions of Change" Youth Summit for the youth in our community. Area high schools who participate include Abby Kelley Foster High School, Burncoat High School, Claremont Academy, Doherty Memorial High School, Holy Name CCHS, North High School, Notre Dame Academy, Shepard Hill High School, St. Peter Marian CCHS, South High Community School, University Park Campus School, and Worcester Technical High School. Throughout the school year, these schools hold winter coat drives, hat and mitten drives, dimes for diapers drives, school supplies and book drives, participation in the WALK for the Homeless and time spent volunteering at the local Shelters holding arts and craft activities for the children and refurbishing furniture for the DCH which is then given to those in need to help make a house a home. YAH plants a seed for young people to become active and involved citizens in the betterment of their community.

#### Hope for Housing

Hope for Housing (HFH) is a partnership developed with the Interfaith Coalition to Prevent Family Homelessness and CMHA. HFH raises community awareness and utilizes the collective buying power of congregations to prevent family homelessness. Currently 29 Worcester area congregations partner with local retailers who donated 3–10% of all sales to CMHA's HFH homelessness prevention funds. In FY 2019, HFH prevented 41 families from becoming homeless with an average grant of \$613.00 per family. Since inception HFH has distributed \$t \$331,454.99 throughout the community for homeless prevention. In addition to providing homeless prevention support. HFH also increases awareness, understanding and advocacy around the issues of homelessness amongst the 29 participating congregations.

#### **Family Shelter**

The largest segment of the homeless population in Worcester County and across the nation continues to be families with school age children. While in shelter, families are assisted and supported to access tools and services in order to overcome barriers and move from homelessness to self-sufficiency and to achieve independent living in their own homes. Services provided to families in and moving from shelter include workforce readiness, budgeting skills, housing search, and parenting skills and support. In FY 2019, CMHA provided emergency shelter and support services to 269 families and of those, 185 families were successfully housed out of shelter with follow up services. In partnership with thee Worcester Community Action Council's Secure Jobs Program, 169 residents of family shelter were assisted in seeking employment opportunities.

#### Family Emergency Shelter and the HomeBase Program

CMHA provided emergency shelter services to 269 families in the past fiscal year and housed 166 famlies from shelter utilizing state HomeBASE flexible assistance resources working with local housing authorities and private landlords. This coordinated Rapid Re-Housing Strategy has proven to be a critical piece in reducing the costs of housing families in emergency shelter for long stays and eliminating the practice of housing families in hotels. The resources allow families to quickly move to sustainable housing with follow up case management and supportive services. 199 families were successfully housed out of shelter with this resource in FY 2019. The average assistance per family of \$5,000 makes good fiscal and moral sense in preventing families from languishing in shelter for 6 months at a cost of \$3,000 per month and most importantly promotes the independence and quality of life for families to move to self-sufficient living. More than 500 households received ongoing stabilization supports.

#### Elder Home Repair & Maintenance

The program coordinates closely with partners in the Elder Service and Health Care Network to allow elder homeowners to remain living independently in their own homes through providing repairs and routine maintenance to keep elders safely and independently housed while preventing long and costly institutional stays. 545 unduplicated senior homeowners were served in FY 2019. The program promotes healthy independent living for senior homeowners through a strong partnership with elder care agencies, health care providers and councils on aging. The program is critical for hundreds of senior homeowners and works to protect their safety and quality of life as well as protecting valuable affordable housing stock for the long term.

#### Housing Counseling and Homelessness Prevention

Housing Counseling is the longest standing and highest volume CMHA program as the point of entry for those facing a housing crisis and saw 7,283 clients in the past year. Rooted in a prevention first model, the program provides counseling, education, and mediation to tenants and landlords as to their rights and responsibilities. Community resources, state and local prevention funds, and other resources are brought together in a holistic approach to address issues that place families at risk of homelessness. Mediation and problem solving is used to resolve housing issues and homeless prevention assistance is made available where the intervention will lead to housing stability. A total of \$712,700 in prevention resources were distributed in 2019 to prevent homelessness for 345 households consisting of 404 children. An average intervention cost of \$2,072 prevented these households from entering shelter at a cost of \$3,000 per month with an average shelter stay of 6 months. Homelessness prevention is the most cost effective and best approach for families to achieve income and housing stability. The average income of those assisted with prevention was \$19,547.

#### **Donations Clearinghouse**


The Donations Clearinghouse (DCH) provides an extraordinary service to families and individuals who have lost their homes and belongings, and are ready to begin anew. The program gathers reusable furniture and home goods from residents of Worcester County who no longer have a use for them, and offers them, free of charge, to those who need them desperately. Rotmans Furniture and Carpet Store is a key partner in providing this service, as are local churches and businesses who hold drives and perform service projects throughout the year.

In Fy19 The DCH Assisted 504 families through over 75 Worcester County agencies referrals and were busy with 589 furniture pickups from Worcester County homes, which was over 2,250 items, which kept the DCH well stocked with household items to help families make a fresh start and make a house a place to call home.
